SASKATOON

"In Saskatoon we know there isn't one single solution that is going to make a difference for the environment. That is why I am so very proud of the results we have achieved on many fronts. To meet the goals of our GHG Plan we are retrofitting facilities with solar panels and efficient boilers and we are constructing alternative energy projects including wind, landfill gas, and turbo expanders.

"What I am most proud of, however, is our efforts to change the way we view demolition. Maple Leaf Foods moved their operations vacating their existing plant. This property was sold to the City to make way for the new Circle Drive South project and the anticipated cost for demolition was to be \$6.5 million. A demolition of this scale would have had significant impacts on the lifespan at the landfill. Instead of demolishing, the City deconstructed the plant.

"The results were tremendous: a total net cost of \$1.4 million and 94.5% (or approximately 4,000 tonnes) of the material was recovered for other uses. Another important diversion away from the landfill the community is proud of is the re-use of 86 old housing units that were scheduled for demolition to make way for a new business park near the airport. These units were moved, renovated, and given a new life as affordable housing for low-income working families. Thinking about environmental sustainability has helped us achieve social sustainability too! It is helping identify economic opportunity in Saskatoon as well."
